Members of the Board present were Commissioner David Poindexter-Chairman, Commissioner David Beck-Member and County Clerk Barbara Barnes. The Board of Delaware County Commissioners is hereby authorized to act on the following items:

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Poindexter followed by the flag salute and roll call. Commissioner Callihan was absent.

Testimony reveals chilling details of 2014 murder case

Two murder suspects in a 2014 murder case pleaded guilty in exchange for their testimony against a man authorities believe is behind the stabbing and torturing of Dustin Carver.

James Larson Jr., 42, Penny Larson, 40, and Bradley Majors,31, were scheduled to appear before Special Judge Nick Lelecas on Thursday, Jan. 29, for the continuation of a preliminary hearing in connection with Carver's death.

Carver, sometimes known as Dusty or Ray Ray, was just 20 years old when he was last seen on March 3, 2014. His last known location was at the Larsons' property in a rural wooded area of southern Delaware County. He was initially reported missing to the Kansas, Oklahoma, Police Department.

Penny Larson pleaded guilty on Wednesday, and Majors pleaded guilty on Thursday to a reduced charge of accessory to felony first-degree murder. In exchange for their testimony against James Larson Jr., Penny Larson received a 20-year suspended sentence, and Majors received a 10-year suspended sentence. Both are required to pay fines and court costs.

After several hours of graphic testimony, including testimony from Majors that Carver's genitals were cut off, Special Judge Nick Lelecas ordered Larson to stand trial and set his district court arraignment for Feb. 2.

Larson's attorney argued that the charge be dismissed, saying that DNA testing results from several bone shards found at a burn pile site are not complete. She raised several questions stemming from Carver's body not being found, and that Penny Larson's and Majors' testimony were very inconsistent.

Testimony

Five witnesses testified, including Carver's mother, who was handcuffed, shackled, and wearing jail clothes, as she tearfully took the stand. Between heavy breathing, Tina Turtle testified that she went to James Larson's residence, asking him if he had seen her son.

"He said he met up with someone in a white truck," Turtle said. "I looked all over Little Kansas, and I called his girlfriend in Coweta - I looked everywhere for my son."

For over three hours, Penny Larson and Majors testified about the night Carver was killed. However, some of their testimonies differed from one another and from statements given to the police that were used to obtain an arrest warrant - but they both agreed James Larson fatally plunged a knife into Carver's chest. Both said they feared Larson, but ultimately, their consciences led them to speak

up. Penny Larson shook during her testimony about being scared of her husband.

It was the discovery of blood on Penny Larson's night shorts and her lie that Carver had raped her that brought out James Larson's fury and deadly wrath, according to testimony.

Penny Larson admitted the rape allegation was not true but: "I yelled out Dustin's name to get him [James Larson] to stop beating me."

Majors described the evening saying "all hell broke loose" when James Larson was told Carver had raped Penny. Carver denied raping the woman, saying, "No, I didn't do that - that's not me," Majors said.

Using a stabbing motion, Penny Larson said her husband stabbed Carver in the upper chest area near his shoulder with a knife. She put the Winchester knife in a zip-lock bag, then into a box. It was eventually left at a previous residence, and she didn't know what became of it.

Penny Larson, who was in her children's bedroom trying to calm them down and get them back to sleep, said she "heard James yell at Bradley to get a bat."

"I heard hitting, fighting, and struggling," said Penny Larson.

Carver was stabbed in the chest and fell to the ground, while James Larson continued to threaten Carver, yelling about his involvement with Penny, according to Majors' testimony.

"The last time I saw him [Carver] was the day he was put on a burn pile," Majors said of his former high school football teammate.

Majors testified that he left the Larsons' residence, and when he returned in the early morning hours, he saw Carver's lifeless body, missing his genitals.

"He said, 'everybody likes to take a souvenir,'" Majors said, referring to his conversation with James Larson.

"He (James Larson) threatened me, saying that I would be next if I didn't help," Majors said. "James told me to keep my mouth shut."

Majors said his conscience led him to go to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation with information on Carver.

"I wish I could forget it all, but I can't," Penny Larson said, referring to the night Carver was killed.

"I have been wanting to come forward - I'm still scared - I just had to get it off my conscience and off my mind," Larson said.

Penny Larson and Majors admitted to using methamphetamine before and after Carver's death.

James Larson will be back in court in February. He's being held without bail in the Delaware County jail.

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
