work was demanding. He often woke before dawn, worked six days a week, and earned modest pay in an expensive city. But the experience sharpened his skills and strengthened his resolve.

While in California, he met the woman who is now his longtime girlfriend. After years of packed schedules and little time together, they decided to make a change. Her uncle, an organic vegetable farmer in Virginia, had a house available near Lexington. They loaded their belongings, drove across the country with their cat, and started over again.

In Virginia, Wheatley worked briefly at a coffee shop before joining a small local bakery. About a year into that job, he felt ready to test his own ideas. With honesty and respect, he approached his boss and asked for permission to sell a limited number of loaves at the local farmers market. They agreed to try it.

The response was steady and encouraging. In January 2025, Wheatley and his girlfriend purchased a fixer upper home. They renovated half of the walkout basement into a licensed commercial bakery, installing new floors, walls, lighting, stainless steel workspaces, a three compartment sink, and a large mixer. He continued farmers market sales while working full time, then gradually reduced his hours to help train his replacement. Recently, he officially stepped away from his day job to focus entirely on his own business.

Conifer Bakery and Homestead reflects both what he is doing now and what he is building toward. More than half of his flour comes from a local mill that grinds it fresh each week. He is expanding his product line and plans to add another farmers market to meet the demands of a new mortgage.

The homestead portion of his vision is already underway. He acquired a one hundred foot hoop house that he dismantled and moved himself. He plans to grow grains, heirloom dry beans, and berries that can be dehydrated and incorporated into shelf stable products like granola. Chickens for eggs are also in the future, along with a walk in cooler and additional outbuildings. All of this is happening while the couple continues to renovate their home.

For Wheatley, entrepreneurship feels less like a gamble and more like a calling. He describes lying awake at night, mentally walking through the layout of his bakery and hoop house, thinking through irrigation lines and product ideas. Then his alarm would ring at two in the morning, and he would head to work for someone else. A good boss. A steady paycheck. But not his vision.

He has never taken formal classes in baking or farming. Instead, he approaches it the way he approached linguistics, by reading, listening, and studying the craft. Last year alone, he listened to a dozen books, including several on farming and one by Mythbusters host Adam Savage about the creative process. He believes in learning by doing and trusting his instincts.

Wheatley's work ethic began early. He started at Braum's at fourteen and has worked in customer service ever since. Those years taught him how to read people and understand what customers value. He trusts that if something does not work, he can adjust.

Though he has lived in Arkansas, California, and now Virginia, Perry remains home. He was born in Stillwater but raised in Perry his entire life. Travel experiences in Europe and across the United States broadened his perspective, yet his roots continue to shape him.

Now, with flour on his hands and a long list of projects ahead, Chase Wheatley is building the life he once saw only in his imagination. The plan he talked about years ago is no longer theoretical. It is rising, one loaf at a time.

This reporter asked Chase to write, in his own words, what he is most thankful for and the importance of having people around you that fully support and love you.

"I wouldn't be where I am today without the support I've received from the people close to me. "Support" is an apt word to use here. We have the French to thank for it; "su-" meaning under and "-port" meaning carry. Quite literally, those who support us keep us from falling. When I started working at Rise & Pies, I didn't have a single notion that it would lead to a career.

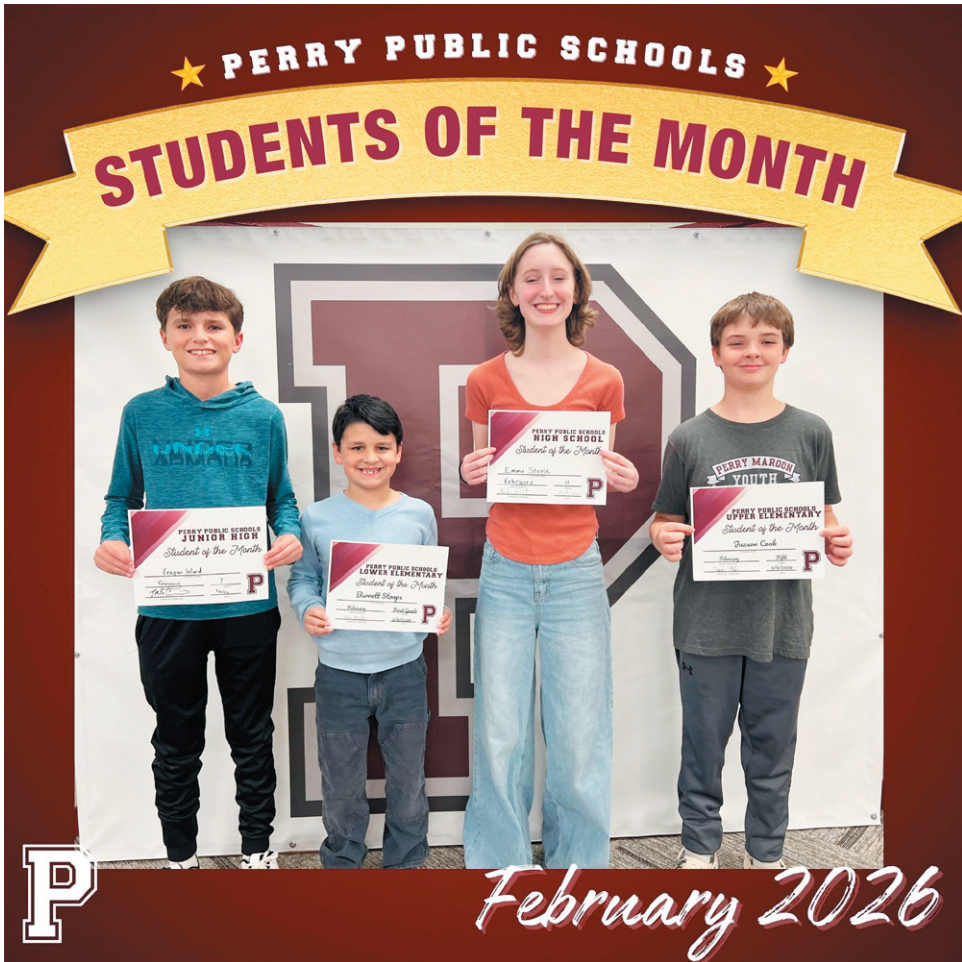
Chase has been perfecting his sourdough recipe and now has his own bakery in the basement of his home in Virginia.
