Jeremy Custer sent the image through Facebook Messenger at 10:15 p.m. on November 19. The hailstone measured about three inches across, roughly the size of a baseball.

The storm system moved across Noble County Wednesday night, bringing bursts of heavy rain and pockets of hail. Loud booms

of thunder were heard throughout the night in Perry along with sounds of the sky cracking open with intermittent doses of heavy rainfall. No major damage was immediately reported, but residents noted brief periods of intense weather.


