# Protect your flock from Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza

Poultry owners large and small need to be made aware that the Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza has returned to Oklahoma. The virus is making its way south from Canada and Alaskan wild migrating waterfowl.

Since last week, many backyard and commercial

poultry flocks in other states have been infected, so far, we only see the influenza in northeast

Oklahoma. HPAI is a viral disease that can spread rapidly and infect many types of birds.

Infected birds shed viruses in their saliva, nasal secretions, and feces, and may infect susceptible birds that come into contact with these substances. Poultry with HPAI do not survive the illness. Vaccines for HPAI are not readily

Know the signs and symptoms:
• Coughing and sneezing

- Difficulty breathing Extreme depression

- Lack of energy
   Decrease in feed or water intake
   Swelling or purple discoloration of head,
- eyelids, comb, wattle and legs
   Decrease in egg production
- Sudden unexplained death Quietness among the flock
- Report cases or suspicious behavior immediately to ODAFF at 405-522-6141.
